Memo for Public Comment to Trinidad City Council October 10, 2023

When the City of Trinidad voted in the mid 2000's to increase the sales tax to a rate above the Humboldt County level, the city worked very hard to ensure that residents living in the 95570-zip code, but outside the city limits, would not be forced to pay the higher sales tax. City staff work closely with the State to alert merchants and sales companies about the two different sales tax rates in the 95570-zip code: currently 8.5% for city residents and 7.75% for residents outside the city limits.

That approach appeared to successfully work for several years as my personal experience would suggest. Unfortunately, that is not the present situation. Online sales are almost entirely charging the higher city tax rate for those of us who live outside the city limits. Amazon is one of the major culprits and even worse, there is almost no ability to talk to a real person to explain the sales tax difference; and if you happen to be successful talking to someone, they are generally clueless about the two rates.

This issue seems to be pervasive throughout the 95570-zip code. An informal survey of residents yielded comments from "Yes I know I'm paying the higher Trinidad tax, but I can't do anything about it." or "I didn't know I was paying the higher tax", to "our city is small you should pay the higher tax to support the city." For those of you who don't know what sales tax rate you are paying, please look at your on-line sales receipts. I would be interested in how many residents this affects.

I admit that I didn't notice I was paying the higher (and probably illegal tax rate) for several years. But recently I reviewed my on-line purchases including significant purchases to remodel a kitchen and bathroom and almost all the purchases were taxed at the higher Trinidad tax rate. I estimate several hundred dollars in excess sales tax paid.

I gladly pay the Trinidad tax when I purchase goods and services within the city limits. And many non-city residents volunteer their time and energy to support the city in numerous ways. But it is unfair and probably illegal that we are being forced to pay the Trinidad sales tax rate without having any input into the tax rate or how the tax funds are spent. Classic taxation without representation.

I have brought this to the attention of City staff, but there has not been much effort to resolve it. Admittedly there may be more important priorities for staff, but enough is enough. The City needs to resolve this issue.

So, I am here tonight to request that the City resolve this sales tax issue. It is incumbent on the city to act responsibly to settle this as soon as possible. At the very least, City staff must return to the Council at the next Council meeting with a plan and schedule to solve this problem and clarify the legal implication of taxing area residents at the City rate. Anything less than that is not acceptable to those of us who support the City but have no say in how our tax dollars are spent.
