**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR QUARTERLY MEETING OF THE TRINIDAD TRAILS
COMMITTEE TUESDAY, OCTOBER 17, 2023 VIA ZOOM**

I. CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL (5:00 P.M.)
Committee Members Present: Jack West (City Council), Tom Hopkins (Planning Com.), Trina Matthews (Trinidad Rancheria), Sherri Provolt (Yurok Tribe), Kelly Lindgren (Tsurai Ancestral Society) joined via Zoom
Committee Members Absent: Tim Needham (Resident)
City Staff: Naffah, Souza

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – *04-18-2023*
This item will be postponed to the next meeting.

III. ITEMS FROM THE FLOOR
None.

IV. DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS

1. Update on the Parker Creek Trail.

City Manager Naffah explained that the Parker Creek Trail was reopened the Friday before Memorial Day. A large log was removed and the base of the trail was made more gradual and less dangerous.

West inquired about future maintenance.

Provolt asked if signage had been updated for Old Home Beach.

2. Update on the repair of the base of the Axel Lindgren Trail.

Naffah informed the Committee that the ALMT remains closed. The six-month closure expires in November. Using a Seventh Generation grant the Tsurai Ancestral Society commissioned GHD to create a report. That report will not be available to the City until after it has been presented to the TAS board.

Lindgren noted that the GHD report is a comprehensive redesign plan and includes restructuring the base of the trail. She said the plan is to present the report to the Tsurai Management Team at the November meeting.

3. Update on the Coastal Commission discussion regarding the Van Wycke Trail.

Naffah reported that the Coastal Commission voted not to accept the appeal and gave the City six months to pursue steps toward opening the trail. He said this would require meetings with the Yurok Tribe, Tsurai Ancestral Society, and the Coastal Commission.

Provolt asked if an erosion study had occurred. Naffah said he would talk to the City Engineer to find out when the last geological report took place.

4. Update on Edwards Street striping and crossing zones next year and how it will effect the trails to the harbor, beach and State Park.

Naffah provided an overview of grant-funded crosswalks and striping at Hector Street and at Galindo Street. He said there is also potential for sidewalks.

5. Bench PowerPoint.

West shared the Trails Bench PowerPoint presentation. He also provided a brief overview of the bench policy.

Provolt suggested creating a unique coastal bench style. Hopkins recommended thicker boards or second growth redwood. Mathewson asked about the budget for bench maintenance.

6. Update on trails guideposts.

West provided photos of various guideposts.

Lindgren recommended metal posts that require less ground disturbance. She asked that post information be sent to the Tsurai Management Team.

West will meet with State Park representatives in November. He stressed consistency with signage.

There was a discussion about the State Park sign across from the Cal Poly Marine Lab. Hopkins suggested incorporating native names for trails and locations.

7. Discussion about plans and specifications for trails and signage designs. This could include maintenance and assessment of trail conditions.

West provided photos of various trail signs and asked for ideas.

Provolt would like to standardize the rock foundations on the benches.

West said that he will also talk with State Parks regarding trail maintenance.

Eli shared that a bench on Edwards is currently being restored. He asked about moving it slightly to the east to provide a view.

8. In-Person meetings.

The Committee discussed AB2449 requiring in-person meetings.

3. Trail Committee Goals.

Trail Committee Goals: These are goals I would like to consider for the meeting. Please bring any suggestions:

- Maintenance Timeline (2024)
 - Develop a timeline for regular maintenance
 - Develop a budget for regular and emergency maintenance
 - Work with the City to define the emergency contact
- Benches (2024)
 - Develop a method for purchasing a bench
 - Open bench purchases to the public
 - Develop a plan for keeping track of dates of purchase and renewals
 - Follow the Bench Policy for all other matters
- Trail Markers (2024)
 - Work with the various partners to come up with consistent markers for all Trinidad trails
 - Work with the State Parks to develop similar signage for travel between entities
 - Find posts that all partners agree look nice but provide the least ground disturbance
 - Decide on the most important trail signage for each post
- Trail Signs (2025-26)
 - Develop signage for larger trails or more information with partnerships
 - Work to develop names or change names for all trails
- Maps of trails and connections (2024-25)
 - Create a map that shows current trails & connections through the City of Trinidad
 - Include connections outside of Trinidad to State lands to the north, the Little River Trail and the Trinidad Head trails
 - When the Axel Lindgren Trail is opened and the decisions about the Van Wycke/Galindo trails are settled, update the map to a permanent design
- State Park Partnership
 - The State Park will be working on the connection to the north of the City
- Yurok Tribe Partnership
 - The Yurok Tribe has an interest in protecting land while keeping trails open, but only on designated trails and benches
 - The Yurok Tribe is concerned about protecting artifacts and ground disturbances in the Trinidad area
- Tsurai Partnership
 - The Tsurai is concerned about protecting the Tsurai Village area and wishes to have public trails defined to keep tourists and locals from leaving the trails
- Rancheria Partnership
 - The Rancheria
- Land Trust Partnership
- The Trinidad Coastal Land Trust would like to see well-marked trails throughout the greater Trinidad area, including stronger signage and well-maintained trails systems
- Vegetation Removal (Ongoing)
 - All partners would like to see invasive plant species removed and native plant species planted
